

Accepting the Challenge Again

The 2023 North Dakota Legislature has once again authorized the VCSU Foundation to match on a two to one basis dollars for endowed scholarships. To fully realize the match, we must privately raise a total of \$2,200,000 to access \$1,100,000 from the Challenge Grant Program. We have until the end of 2024 to realize our match.

Since 2013 we have received just over \$11.7 million dollars in both pledged and matched dollars. This year's allocation is the highest to VCSU since the program was initiated. VCSU and our donors have established or enhanced over 225 scholarship endowments through the challenge fund matching grants.

This is a great opportunity to consider establishing an endowed scholarship or contributing to an existing endowed scholarship program. Using this program, a growing number of VCSU Alumni and Friends have established endowed scholarships in their family name, or in honor of a special person in their life or leveraging a portion of an estate to receive matching dollars. Many alumni or friends are using their IRA Required Minimum Distribution to fund an endowed scholarship with the Challenge Grant program.

As an additional incentive, North Dakota residents also qualify for a 40% endowment tax credit for contributions of \$5,000 or more (lump sum or aggregate in one year). At Valley City State, our Alumni and Friends are embracing the opportunities that the North Dakota Challenge Fund Match Program creates by allowing their charitable gifts to be matched – therefore giving

more, costing less, and having a greater impact than ever before.

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NORTH DAKOTA CHALLENGE FUND MATCHING GRANT

The 2023 North Dakota legislature has again created a program to match funds donated to Valley City State University. VCSU has been allocated up to \$1,100,000 million of matching dollars if the University can raise \$2,200,000 in private donations. The funds enhance more than 225 scholarship endowment funds.

Matching dollar pledges are allowed over a seven year period. Leveraging a portion of an estate to receive matching dollars is also available.

With a minimum \$5,000 endowment gift to VCSU through the VCSU Foundation, you may benefit from a North Dakota income tax credit equal to 40% of the charitable gift AND also qualify for your donation to be matched \$1 for every \$2 you give.

NORTH DAKOTA ENDOWMENT GIFT CREDIT

The endowment credit allows individuals, businesses and financial institutions to give more, and have a greater impact on the state's quality of life. An endowment is a fund with the principal invested and remains intact in perpetuity. Only the interest is used to fund the scholarship allocation.

An individual may receive a 40% tax credit for contributions of \$5,000 or more (lump sum or aggregate in one year) to a qualified North Dakota endowment.



VCSU Rated as One of the Best Colleges in America

Rating by Money.com determined through quality and affordability

Valley City State University (VCSU) has been rated as one of the Best Colleges in America for 2023 by Money.com.

VCSU was given four out of five stars and is one of four North Dakota schools included in the ratings. The overall ratings are determined by comparing acceptance rates, affordability, graduation rates, and employment after graduation. VCSU was one of 736 colleges in the United States listed.

"External ratings reinforce the approach we are taking to helping

students achieve their goals. We are proud to be recognized by another entity for our quality and affordability," VCSU President Alan LaFave said. "VCSU continues to invest in our students, take steps to help keep a college education affordable, and ensure students have access to one of the best educational experiences possible."

VCSU has seen enrollment grow by 21% in the past decade, in part due to continued scholarship support for students. Scholarships are provided through the generous support of

donors and the VCSU Foundation, providing almost \$2 million in scholarships last year. According to Money.com, 92% of VCSU students with financial need receive grants.

"Supporting students and ensuring everyone has the opportunity to pursue an education is one of our most important missions," Executive Director of the VCSU Foundation Cory Anderson '89, said. "We are grateful to work with so many dedicated donors and alumni who are committed to helping the next generation of students succeed."

VCSU Trap Club Earns 1st Place at ND Collegiate Clay Target Championship

Twelve students from Valley City State University (VCSU) Trap Club took home the championship in American Trap at the North Dakota State Collegiate Clay Target Championship on Saturday, April 29, 2023 in Jamestown, N.D.

VCSU students earned a total score of 422/500, beating out other competitive teams from around the state. "Weather conditions were everything but ideal so the fact that they still performed at that level is certainly something to be very proud of," VCSU Trap Club Advisor and Associate Professor of Science, Nick Galt, said. "These students have worked hard this season, have grown as a team, and have remained focused."



VCSU's Trap Club was formed in 2021 and has almost 20 students participating this year. The group practices at the Valley City Trap Club with the help of Chuck and Sandi Mielke and compete in the USA College Clay Target League.

VCSU group travels to South America

Fourteen adventurous individuals, associated with Valley City State University, with a variety of experience, skill sets, and interests recently joined together on a service-learning trip to Buenos Aires, Argentina.

The group focused on learning about different cultures and understanding programming and resources that minimize violence in relationships.

Each day was filled with cultural activities and educational programming. The group learned about five different groups working with a variety of organizations. Through meetings and tours, the group learned resources provided to Argentinian citizens by private, city, national, and international organizations

Highlights of the trip included attending a soccer match where the home team, San Lorenzo, won 2-0, followed by a spread of food while learning about national legislation aimed at protecting partners of players of professional sports from violence. After the game, the VCSU group had an opportunity to go on the field.





VCSU School of Education and Graduate Studies Reaccredited Through 2030

Valley City State University's (VCSU) School of Education and Graduate Studies has been reaccredited through 2030 by the Council for Accreditation of Educator Preparation (CAEP).

The accreditation process requires a comprehensive evaluation of the curriculum and field experiences. This includes reviewing the teaching and content knowledge, skills, and dispositions for teacher candidates to successfully enter the profession. VCSU demonstrated quality assurance and evidence that teacher candidates, completers, and the teacher education program are meeting the state and CAEP standards. The process included a self-study report from VCSU, followed by feedback from the CAEP team, and a virtual site visit by a CAEP team with representatives from five different states. VCSU

successfully met each standard. The next CAEP accreditation site visit will be during the 2029-2030 school year.

"Our School of Education has one of the best teacher preparation programs in the nation. The program is exceptional, and we are extremely proud of our faculty and staff who have dedicated their careers to preparing future teachers," VCSU President Dr. Alan LaFave said. "Reaccreditation from CAEP without any areas for improvement or stipulations reaffirms the quality of our education program."

"We are thrilled to receive this reaccreditation as it solidifies our standing as one of the highest-quality education programs in the nation," Dean for the School of Education Dr. Allen Burgad said. "The CAEP reaccreditation process highlights our priorities of helping students succeed in the

classroom every day. Thank you to Dr. Al Olson, Dr. Jim Boe, and the VCSU faculty, staff, and community stakeholders who participated in the accreditation process. Their efforts and commitment were significant in the success of our review."

"This reaccreditation, paired with the movement toward transforming McCarthy Hall are two critical pieces in our work to meet teacher workforce needs," President LaFave said. "This is an exciting time for our campus."

The programs included in this accreditation cycle include Art Education, Biology Education, Business Education, Chemistry Education, Elementary Education, English Education, Health Education, Mathematics Education, Music Education, Physical Education, Social Studies Education, Technology Education and VCSU's Master of Arts in Teaching.



VCSU Hosts Dakota Digital Academy Bootcamp

Program brings teachers back into the classroom during summer months to learn about all things tech

While most teachers are spending the summer enjoying the warm weather, a group of 16 found themselves back in the classroom this summer at Valley City State University (VCSU). VCSU hosted a two-day IT/Cyber bootcamp for K-12 teachers. The program was offered in partnership with the Dakota Digital Academy (DDA) and the Northern Information Technology Consortium (NITC) and brought the group together in the basement of Vangstad Auditorium.

Janet Bartels, a high school math teacher from Wahpeton, N.D., signed up for the class with her coworker Elizabeth Lasch. Lasch teaches computer classes at the high school level and the pair spent the first morning of class working with programming languages. The class spent time programming small robotic cars to get handson experience with various programming languages.

"It's something I've never done before," Bartels said. "We were working with circuits which was interesting."

Bartels and Lasch said they saw parallels between the morning lesson and their classroom objectives. Concepts like the order of operations and logical processes are applicable to programming, math, and general computer skills. They also thought activities like programming to direct a small vehicle would be of interest to some of their students.

"I think some of my students would be really interested in this because it's hands-on," Bartels said. This type of activity is teaching more than just math concepts, she explained. "We are teaching students to think, and to use that higher level thinking around problem-solving."

Instructor and Assistant Professor of Computer Systems and Software Engineering, Dr. Yang Du, said that using a car kit in the programming session is a fun way to bring skills to life.

"Teaching programming to calculate things like overtime payments can be unappealing for students, but this is fun," he said. Other topics covered during the bootcamp include cybersecurity, the internet of things and networking.

"Although each topic is usually covered in full semester classes," Du explained, "the bootcamp is designed to be a fun and quick overview of these topics for teachers of all levels."

"I think it's good for everyone to get the basic concepts," Du said.

The Dakota Digital Academy was established to help provide access to digital-cyber oriented education, training, certificates, and knowledge. It is a collaboration among NDUS campuses, in partnership with select business and corporate partners.

Carlsrud Receives Distinguished Service Award

Mayor Dave Carlsrud was presented the VCSU Distinguished Service Award this spring. The award recognizes partners and friends for their exceptional contributions toward the University's vision. President Alan LaFave presented the award. INSTEM Academy Held on the VCSU Campus Again



Fifty-four students were on campus this summer to learn about various Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) topics through the Great Plains STEM Education Center (GPSEC). The cohorts are for North Dakota (ND) Native American middle and high school students. The program, officially named INSTEM (Indians into STEM), aims to increase awareness and interest in STEM careers among ND Native American K-12 students. Students this summer learned about audio production, gene editing and river health.

2023 Spring Commencement











Valley City State University (VCSU) hosted spring commencement on Saturday, May 13, 2023, at W.E. Osmon Fieldhouse. President Alan LaFave presided over the commencement exercises. 149 degrees were conferred. VCSU has now conferred 27,510 degrees total.

Chancellor Dr. Mark Hagerott represented the North Dakota State Board of Higher Education. Graduating senior, Angeline Gannon, delivered the undergraduate reflection, and the faculty reflection was presented by Taylor Mounts, assistant professor of business.

















Teacher Education

Built as a place for college students to take their first steps as teachers, McCarthy Hall has shaped the future of thousands. It stands on the precipice of change with an imminent remodeling project that reinforces its true mission – to serve as a space for foundational education.

At first glance, McCarthy Hall stands at the edge of VCSU's campus with dignified and purposeful presence. Upon closer inspection, the smooth sculptures adorning the stairway and shining terrazzo floors tell the story of a well-loved space built for activity and inspiration.

This space, has remained in use, but mostly unaltered for almost 100 years. Now, McCarthy Hall is on the precipice of transformation.

In the early 1930s, the North Dakota Legislature used \$115,000 to construct the Training School, now known as McCarthy Hall. This year, that same body approved \$11.5 million to renovate the building. In total, the project will cost \$13.5 million, the remaining portion being raised through generous supporters.

The renovation will breathe life into this historic space, but the story of this building was never about the bricks. The real story is told by those who remember the inspiring leadership of the College High School Principal, Thilda Vangstad '29, or those who met the love of their life in one of the assembly rooms during study hall. This is a place that shaped


people for life. Individuals that went on to shape the lives of others.

This is a space where teachers presented their first lesson, or conducted their first band rehearsal. This is

where students saw first-hand how the care and attention from a kind teacher could transform a lifetime. This is the story of McCarthy Hall and the future home of VCSU's School of Education.

A place to call home

Jay Cink's early life was literally surrounded by VCSU. As a child, his family ran the long- gone grocery store that used to sit where the Memorial Student Center is currently. When he was old enough for school, he loved the sandbox and rocking horse in the kindergarten room just down the hall from the university president's office. Cink's first job outside of the family store was washing uniforms for the college's athletic director Bill Osmon.



teachers attending VCSU as they took their first step as teachers with real students like Cink.

"We had a great education. Some of the student teachers were fabulous," Cink said. If the teacher in training was not

a good fit for the classroom, "you only had to put up with them for 11 or 12 weeks," he added.

Although the student teachers were numerous and varied in skill, the long-term faculty

that felt like home for many.

Teachers like Roger Ludwig and many more were inspired by Thilda Vangstad who "commanded respect, but didn't demand it." This inspiration pushed Cink to pursue a degree in education at VCSU. When he started as a college student, he found himself in familiar spaces like the first floor of McCarthy for technology class. He was also a step ahead of other students as he had the opportunity to take college courses as a junior and senior in high school, some of the first versions of popular dual credit offerings now offered.

Although he never became a teacher, Cink is one of the few who attended school on campus from Kindergarten through his undergraduate degree. He is thrilled the upcoming renovation will improve a space that was home for so many of his foundational experiences.

He keeps a photo of the vision for the remodeled space in his office at home, reminding him of the exciting future ahead for his old high school.

From function to the future

The renderings show the exterior of the building mostly unchanged, but the interior will completely transform. "The new spaces in McCarthy Hall will offer classrooms where students can prepare to be teachers of the future," Dean of the School of Education Allen Burgad, '89, said.

"I had the opportunity to take courses like psychology and education in McCarthy 257 in 1987 and 1988," Burgad said. "When I interviewed at VCSU in 2022, the classroom had not changed."

The renovation project will take the classroom from a rowcentered, teacher-centered model, to the style of classroom now found in most elementary, middle and high schools. A style that focuses on education and peer collaboration.

"The spaces will be comfortable and represent what elementary and secondary classrooms look like now," Burgad said. "Having collaborative spaces and learning centers allows peers to interact and the educational experience is much richer when there is dialogue."

"Our purpose is to design McCarthy very similar to what an elementary middle and high school classroom would look like," he said.

Almost 100 years ago when McCarthy Hall was first built, it was also designed to mirror a typical classroom. It was three stories with 11 large classrooms and two large assembly rooms according to the school newspaper The Budget. There was a small theater on the first floor for "demonstration classes" and the space was more than enough to accommodate the 22 faculty supervisors working with teacher candidates.

The building first opened in 1931 and offered a unique experience for pupils. In the summer of 1963, College High School's Superintendent H. O. Pearce sent a newsletter stating the State Board of Higher Education asked to close the school in the spring of 1965.

The building remained, but the halls were quieter. Eventually the VCSU Technology Department and, for a time, the Art Department moved in. Plans for a new home for the School of Education began to take shape and VCSU launched the first capital campaign in the history of the school in 2021. Part of that campaign brought the McCarthy Hall renovation to life. This spring, 60 years after the newsletter from Superintendent Pierce was sent, the same board that closed College High approved money for its renovation for the future.

Breathing life into a historic place

"This is such a beautiful building," she

said walking down the hallway with her

Both John and Virginia graduated in the last class of College High.

"I was so afraid that like other places, this could get knocked down and there goes the history. I'm really excited about the renovation and what it's going to be when it's done."

For Virginia, removing the old army-green metal lockers makes sense. During her time attending College High they were necessary because books were numerous, and heavy.

"Now there is a computer in every back pack, not a bunch of books," she said smiling.

Despite their absence, Virginia knows exactly where her locker used to line the 3rd floor hallway in McCarthy Hall. Her locker was only a few away from a farm boy who had just started attending College High.

"I was his tour guide on his first day," she said. The two sat near each other during assemblies and study hall in the large classroom on the east side of the building. They eventually married, had a family and farmed near Valley City.

"It was a really unique experience," she said of attending College High, "because we were small and very close."

The pair were a part of the final graduating class from College High, which closed in 1965. Now, more than 50 years after graduation, both John and Virginia say the care and kindness from long-term faculty like Thilda Vangstad '29 and Lillian Langemo Jacobson '40 shaped their lives. They were witness to dozens of new teachers testing their abilities in the classroom for the first time.

The function of the school was always clear, to learn and help new teachers gain experience. That process created a close community. For example, Virginia remembers having a young college student named George Gaukler, '62, as a student teacher. The year after, John met Gaukler as a first-year math teacher at the rural school he attended before coming to College High. That young teacher went on to become a successful business man and is chair to VCSU's current capital campaign.

Transforming into a teacher

The number of student teachers who taught their first class in McCarthy Hall is difficult to count,

but Carol Skogen Meyers '68 learned from many of them. Carol attended elementary, high school and college on campus as did her brother Luther Skogen '68. Although her family lived out of town, her mother insisted they attend the training school.

"We had excellent teachers," Meyers said. Having numerous student teachers from the college gave her class experience in teacher evaluation. "We always knew within a day, which student teachers were going to be a good teacher."

After Meyers moved from elementary in McFarland Hall "across the bridge" into McCarthy Hall, she felt the school pride and a sense of belonging that existed for the College High Baby Vikings.

One of the classes she took regularly was band. At times, the band instructor or student teacher would be late. Meyers would pick up the baton and "get the band going." This practice would be a part of much of her professional life.



After she graduated in 1964, Meyers returned to VCSU and finished her composite music degree, thus beginning a long career of shaping hundreds of music students in rural North Dakota. From Finley to Page, Hunter and Arthur, Meyers taught K-12 music for years, retiring from Northern Cass Public School in 2004. She remembers many of her students, including one of her trumpet players, Doug Burgum, who eventually went on to become governor of North Dakota.

Even though she didn't realize it at the time, Meyers said her time in high school and college experience must have influenced her classroom management style and approach to teaching.

"All my students were special and that connection made teaching so special," she said. "It was special and rewarding."


Meyers learned that from Dr. Loren Waa, her band director at VCSU. Throughout her career she saw other VCSU music graduates in the field of education.

Expanding the legacy of VCSU

One of Meyers classmates, Larry Wicks '66, also pursued a career in education after his time attending the training school, College High and VCSU.







He started at College High in 7th grade and at one time, counted up the number of student teachers he learned from. Sixty-seven was the final total.

Instruction was, at times, delivered in smaller class sizes because there were multiple student teachers who needed experience. This was a benefit of attending College High.

After graduation, Wicks attended VCSU and became an educator in Minnesota before becoming active in the Minnesota Education Association.

Throughout his profession he saw how College High was similar physically to other schools built

in the 1930s, but had the benefit of a close connection with college faculty and student teachers doing the instruction.

"It was similar, but unique," he said.

Wicks went on to work in education-related roles with various organizations, and eventually retired as the Executive Director of the Ohio Education Association in 2013.

Wicks is excited to see how the renovation of McCarthy hall expands the legacy of VCSU as an institution. He recalled walking through McCarthy Hall after College High closed and feeling a sense that the space could be used for much more.

"I think this renovation is terrific," he said. "It makes a lot of sense."

Providing limitless opportunity

2022 graduate Keaton Kvilvang agrees. Kvilvang's family includes many VCSU graduates and his grandfather Curt Kvilvang attended College High.

As a freshman, Kvilvang took a psychology class in McCarthy Hall and described the classroom as having a "rustic, traditional" feel.

"It was interesting to see the differences between some of the more modern classrooms and these traditional classrooms on campus," he said.

While the classrooms have not changed a great deal since his grandfather attended College High, Keaton Kvilvang said having a modern environment for learning will enhance the overall experience for students.

"Surely the old look and feel will be missed. but having a modern environment for students to not only receive lecture, but to find a quiet place on campus for studying and reading will provide limitless opportunities," he said.

Keeping the Crew Together

Connections forged through school, coaching and a mutual love of athletics remain strong for a group of VCSU alumni and friends that gather weekly

2007, when Myron Loberg and Gene Manson, friends who both coached and taught in Devils Lake, got together after Myron moved to Fargo. They met regularly and the group began to increase as they each invited other coaches and friends to join them.

It all started in

In 2018, a few weeks after VCSU coach, mentor and friend Dr. Larry "Buck" Grooters '57 lost his beloved wife, Hazel, Gene Boyle '69 suggested to Loberg '68 that it was time for old friends to go to lunch. Loberg, a former student of Grooters who also coached track and taught, Boyle, Tom Kirchoffner '68 and Bill Coghlan '67 took Coach Grooters out for lunch and talked about sports, coaching and life in general.

The group started to grow, and this tradition continues to this day. Although Dr. Grooters seat is sadly empty, the spirit of joy and love of sports he brought to the table is still

present. Coach Grooters would drive in every Wednesday, even if he was at his lake place.

The men at the table have many shared experiences, including a few escapades from their days at VCSU. Still, everyone at the table has their own unique and inspiring story.

They started to pull in individuals who shared similar interests. Gene Boyle is a member of the North Dakota High School Officials

Association Hall of Fame and worked in education and government

for 42 years. Loberg knew Marty Thielges who also coached.

Across the table, Coghlan shares stories about coaching in South Dakota and negotiating with his players about the length of their hair and curfews.

Les Stensgaard '69 laughs when he says he taught Kirchoffner how to play basketball.

Kirchoffner laughs and explains that he was named one of the top five basketball players from the

1960s in North Dakota, right along with Phil Jackson. He taught for decades and when his son was born, Leo Ringey's '73 wife covered as a substitute teacher for him. Ringey lived across the street from Mick Conlon '69.

Conlon saw a picture of the group in a previous Bulletin and showed up the next week with his VCSU letterman's jacket on at their previous location, the Cajun Cafe.

> When that restaurant closed, the group moved to Deaner's Diner in

West Fargo, and the connections continued.

The tone is light, the knowledge of sports is deep and it all continues to come together with the quiet encouragement of Myron Loberg. Loberg, a legendary coach and trainer of athletes, is still connecting people through activity. The former teacher enjoys the weekly, informal gatherings.

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2023-24: Season of Change

I'm very excited to start my 30th year at VCSU and officially become the Athletic Director/Head Football Coach for Viking Athletics, I know it's hard to understand how I'm taking on two fulltime jobs and doing that



at a high level, and I think that is a great auestion.

The short answer is that I'm NOT taking on two full-time jobs. What we've done is reimagined how leadership can look in our athletic department and then taken the athletic director job and started dividing up the workloads between other highly qualified people.

Anna Bratsch is an Associate AD/ Director of Sports Medicine and Mark Potts is an Assistant AD/SID, and both have taken on roles that will help cover every requirement that our past AD's have done. We've also hired Steve Olson '88 as our Director for Athletic Development and Game Management, and I know he'll do an excellent job helping to lead our fundraising and gameday efforts.

We've taken the previous athletic director salary and spread it out where needed, helping to take better care of our people while also keeping that salary in athletics in case we go back to a full-time athletic director in the future. I appreciate Dr. LaFave giving me the opportunity to remain head football coach - which is

Michelle Meiklejohn was named our head volleyball coach, replacing Brigitte Greywater, and Alec DeMaria was named our head baseball coach, replacing Casey Olney.

It's never easy replacing coaches who have helped impact our programs in a positive way, but adding new staff can also bring a new energy to Viking Athletics. I know it seems funny coming from the old guy who's been here forever, but I truly do believe that we need to find ways to inject new ideas and new ways to look at things differently than we've done. Viking Softball wins second straight NSAA postseason title

The Valley City State softball team finished the 2023 season with a North Star Athletic Association Tournament Championship title and a bid to the NAIA National Tournament Opening Round held in Baldwin City, Kan.

VCSU went 24-21 on the season and had an 18-7 record in conference play. The Vikings went into the NSAA Tournament as a No. 2 seed and went undefeated in the tournament, upending top-ranked Bellevue to win the NSAA Tournament and earn an automatic bid to the NAIA Opening Round for the second straight season. The Vikings dropped both their games at the Opening Round, losing close games against No. 6 College of Idaho and Indiana University Southeast.

VCSU pitcher Maddy Zander earned NSAA Newcomer of the Year and nine Vikings earned All-Conference awards. Zander, Riley Perryman, Ashlynne Copinga and Sierra Crocker were named First Team All-Conference while Ashlyn Diemert, Joelle Lamontagne, Alyssa DePoorter, Marissa Hawkins and Andrea Rodriguez were Second Team All-Conference.

Andrea Rodriguez earned her second career NSAA Gold Glove award for outstanding defense.


Seniors Riley Perryman and Ashlynne Copinga were each named NAIA Honorable Mention All-Americans after leading the Vikings and setting individual

school records in the 2023 season.

Perryman finished her Viking career with records in games played (220), walks (83) and home runs (33). She also set a single-season record with 20 doubles in 2023. Ashlynne Copinga now holds the school record with 71 runs scored in a season and is second in school history with 46 stolen bases.



As a team, the 2023 Vikings set new school records with 365 RBI, 113 doubles and 165 walks. VCSU also held national Top-10 rankings including 2nd in doubles (113), 4th in RBI (365), 4th in extra-base hits (168), 6th in runs scored (389), 8th in home runs (43), 9th in slugging percentage (.511) and 10th in total bases (769).



Baseball battles weather during challenging spring

The Valley City State baseball team finished the 2022-23 season with a 13-34 overall record and an 8-20 mark in conference play.

The Vikings entered the postseason as the No. 7 seed for the NSAA Tournament, where VCSU posted a 1-2 record that included a win over No. 6 seed Viterbo University.

A highlight of the season included a fourgame series sweep over Presentation College which included a walk-off home run by Shane Nixon. The Vikings hit 20 home runs during the four-game series, including four home runs in a row during one of the games.

Due to heavy snow during the winter and a cold start to the spring, the Vikings did not play any official home games during the spring season.

Sophomore catcher Jaden Babiuk and sophomore pitcher Hunter Magnuson were both named 2nd Team All-Conference, while senior outfielder Drew Nixon and senior infielder Adam Thompson earned Honorable Mention All-Conference.

Babiuk led the Vikings and was fifth in the conference with a .396 batting average in the regular season. He also caught more than half of VCSU's games and led the conference with 15 runners thrown out. Magnuson came into his own as a starting pitcher and dominated in conference play with a 2.41 ERA. He finished with a 4-4 record


After the season, longtime head coach Casey Olney announced he was resigning to pursue other opportunities. During Olney's 16 years as head coach the Vikings set 21 team or individual school records - which includes a school record 32 wins during the 2014-15 season.















3 Viking Golfers earn 2nd Team All-Conference

The VCSU Golf teams competed in three tournaments this spring after numerous schedule changes due to weather and course availability.

Three golfers finished in the top 14 at the North Star Athletic Association Tournament to earn Second Team All-Conference honors. The conference tournament was played at the par-72 Platteview Golf Club in Bellevue, Neb.

Senior Hayley Shanks earned her second career All-Conference honor after placing 10th in the tournament, carding a 189 (96-93). Freshman Sydney Carlson finished in 13th place to earn her first Second Team All-Conference accolade. She fired a two-day 194 at the tournament (94-100).

On the men's side, junior transfer Grant Inniger earned Second Team All-Conference in his first appearance at the NSAA Championships. He fired a 168 (86-82) to finish in 14th place.

Inniger led the Viking men with a 79.2 scoring average in six rounds this spring. He carded a career-best one-under par in the opening round of the VCSU Spring Invite.

Odegard places 4th at nationals to highlight Track & Field season

Kendra Odegard placed fourth in the nation and earned All-American honors to highlight the 2023 outdoor track and field season at VCSU.

A sophomore from Lisbon, N.D., Odegard placed 4th in women's javelin at the NAIA National Championships with her top throw of 45.08 meters. She won the javelin throw at five difference meets during the season and had the third best throw in the nation during the regular season.

Odegard was one of three Vikings who qualified for outdoor nationals, joining senior Taylor Sargent (women's 100 hurdles) and freshman Jaiden Peraza (men's high jump) as VCSU's national meet qualifiers.

At the North Star Athletic Association conference championships, the Vikings finished with five All-Conference performances (Top 3). Odegard won the conference title in javelin and other All-Conference finishes included Sargent (3rd, 100 hurdles), Garrett Ward (2nd, men's javelin) and Peraza (2nd in high jump & 3rd in long jump).
