


of Higher Education reported that undergraduate enrollments declined in every sector. Public 4-year institutions reported a 3.8% decrease in fall enrollment from the previous year. While we maintain our excellent undergraduate enrollment numbers, our graduate enrollment increased by nearly 20% this past fall.

Our commitment to provide topnotch facilities is part of planning for the future at VCSU. Our capital campaign is off to a wonderful start with more than \$5.3 million in current pledges and gifts to help ensure the future success of the institution.

Our success is only achieved through the continued support of our alumni, community, state and nation.

Keep Meeting the Challenge

Greetings from the Foundation Office at Valley City State University.

In 2013 North Dakota legislators created the North Dakota Challenge Fund



Matching Grant Program. Once funding applications are approved, the North Dakota University System Office disburses the funds to our campus by allocating \$1 for every \$2 raised through private donors.

So, how are we doing? The answer is very well, thanks to our alumni and friends — the donors for this program — who are completely and highly motivated by the state's commitment to support philanthropy. They have a great affinity for this institution, as well as great respect for the impact it made

on their lives and the opportunities they have had because of their time as a Valley City State student or friend. Their attitude of gratitude is amazing.

The VCSU Foundation is using the Challenge Grant fund to enhance the scholarship program at Valley City State University. Since 2013, 97 unique donors have contributed more than \$7 million through the Challenge Grant, which was matched with over \$3.5 million from the state of North Dakota.

That movement alone provided more than 85 new scholarship endowment funds bringing us to over 260 endowed scholarships at VCSU. The decision of how these funds are allocated as scholarships is also determined by the donor.

Thanks to the Challenge Grant, our donors are willing to stretch themselves to have even more of an impact in partnership with the state of North Dakota. And when you have alumni,

friends, corporations, and others who care so much about VCSU that they are willing to give of their time, their talent and their treasures, that really can lift our institution.

At that pivotal point in a young student's life, our alumni and friends are there to invest in the next generation. This is why Valley City State is a place that changes lives. We get to see that investment happening and coming together.



You, Your IRA and the Forward Together Capital Campaign

The Individual Retirement Account (IRA) is a very popular savings program for millions of Americans.



It is a

structured retirement tool that provides additional financial security at the time of retirement.

The goal of building a retirement portfolio is to provide income when you stop working. You should start taking withdrawals when you need income, provided you have a strategy in place to keep your assets from depleting. Most financial advisors will suggest as a "best practice" not to take more than 5% in a given year, but your personal income may vary. Some investors may be positioned not to need income from their portfolio until well into their retirement.

It is important to understand that IRA Accounts are subject to RMD's (Required Minimum Distributions). RMD's are legally mandated

withdrawls that begin to affect an IRA once the investor turns 72 years of age or 70 $\frac{1}{2}$ if they reached 70 $\frac{1}{2}$ in 2019.

The exciting benefit of an IRA is that Congress has enacted legislation to provide for a permanent IRA Rollover. The provisions of this legislation allow you to roll over up to \$100,000 annually to a charity of your choice, tax free. Yes, tax free. To qualify, the funds must be transferred directly to our foundation.

For example, you could elect to make a pledge to VCSU's Capital Campaign and use your RMD from your IRA, to make the annual payments on the pledge. Should you pass away prior to all the pledges payments having been made, the balance of the pledge can be made from your estate. This is an actual example of a gift made to our Capital Campaign by a friend/ donor to the university. In this case, the donor elected to make a pledge to the Capital Campaign of \$1,000,000 from an IRA. The donor set the pledge payments to be made from his RMD in his IRA at \$100,000 annually. The payments

will continue over a 5 year time period. Should the donor pass away in the interim, the balance of the pledges due will be transferred to the Capital Campaign account.

Needless to say, the above scenario is exciting. This donor is being very creative and generous. He is in fact, creating the future today! This gift will touch the lives of future generations of students here at VCSU. It will be a gift that keeps on giving. His legacy is clearly in place!

As the Director of VCSU's Capital Campaign, Forward Together, I encourage you give serious consideration to supporting our campaign. Every gift, big or small, is critical to the success of this campaign. I have had the honor of serving on the staff of our university since 1975, and I am also a 1971 graduate of VCSU. I assure you that this campaign is based on actual needs and not wants. It is my firm belief "that this is our time." Join me as we move Forward Together!

From Essential To Inspiration

How the New Center for the Arts is Transforming Student Experiences at Valley City State University

What started as an idea at Valley City State University has become a reality.

The Center for the Arts building is open for classes, and students participating in art or music have a new place to call home.

"The students are very comfortable in the classrooms, happy and excited," President Alan LaFave said. "We wanted to provide a space that would be welcoming and help our faculty deliver the highest possible educational experiences. We wanted to create a venue that could be used by the community. We needed a hub for cutting-edge technology and

innovation for our students."

The new space achieves those goals, LaFave said.

The building not only enhances the student experience now but will generate a place for music and arts programs to thrive and grow.

"I see it becoming a beehive of activity," he said. "This can be a place for developing skills that help students improve their craft, whether it's visual arts or performing arts. It will inspire creative activity."

Freshman music education major Jayden Moser agreed.

"There are so many new opportunities as a musician here,"

the Jamestown, N.D., student said. "I can do a lot more in this building, and it is just amazing."

Moser said she appreciates the ability to adjust the acoustic tuning in many of the rooms and having identified spaces to practice and improve.

"I love spending my time here," she said smiling. "I am here all of the time because the environment is very

welcoming. It is just a really great place to be."

Providing a welcoming and inspiring space was one of the main goals for the center.

"The Center for the Arts is not only a beautiful, spectacular facility, it's also very practical and usable," LaFave said. "The classrooms are flexible spaces that can be used for many different types of educational experiences."

Incorporating flexible classrooms with natural light was a priority for Angela Mircsov, art department chair.

"We focused on having natural light for creating artworks" she said. "We wanted to design safe, clean studios to teach students in the most professional way possible."

VCSU has students working with 2D, 3D, 4D and digital works. Creating art in the new space has been inspiring, Mircsov said.

"Ceramics and other classes have natural light and it creates an openness for the students to create," she said. "The printmaking studio has presses, and a beautiful view of campus."

There is also dedicated space for three upcoming seniors to focus on their creative works and develop materials for their senior art show.

"Having the proper lighting and room to create helps our students learn differently," Mircsov said. "I am hoping students will take inspiration from this space and other departments and community members see all the possibilities of collaborating with our disciplines."

Junior art education major Nicole Hurt said creating in the new building has been a great experience.

"There is more room to breathe," the Hillsboro, N.D., student said. "It's nice to have a space to do my work and overall it's been great."

Hurt said she spends the majority of

her time in the digital design and computer lab. She also has access to the senior studio as she begins preparing materials for her art show.

This building just feels different," Hurt said. "It's more open and welcoming. It is nice to have a place to call our own."

Hurt's classmate Mitchell Silkman of Waite Park, Minn., agreed that the space feels different.

"This is a place for us, as a university, to act on the numerous opportunities we have at our fingertips," the senior said. "This is a place where stagnate ideas can become a reality."

Silkman also utilizes the senior art studio space. He is preparing for a senior art show this spring.

"The space feels much different. We have more space physically and mentally for creative minds to flourish," Silkman said.

Watching students flourish in the warmth of the new building has been inspiring for Jerrold Heide, music department chair.

The practice rooms are comfortable and students are spending more time in the building.

"We have more students scheduling practice room time, and we are seeing an increase of collaboration between students as well," he said.

Also, students can perform in places with full control over the acoustical elements of the room.

"We can control the sound in rehearsal spaces so it matches the performance spaces perfectly," Heide said. "It removes the need for last-minute adjustment and allows us to do more and engage students to their full potential."

In mid-February, Heide conducted the first ensemble concert in the Performance Hall.

"It's the perfect size," he said. "It's large enough to meet the capacity needs, but small enough to maintain the intimate feel with a crowd in the hall. You can feel the intensity from the applause and that makes a performance more interactive," Heide said.

Music faculty have been utilizing the acoustically-designed practice rooms, larger areas for group practice, choral hall and band room.

Practicing in a room that is very similar to the performance venue allows instructors and performers the chance to focus on the music and not the logistics.

"With the Center for the Arts, the Performance Hall is unparalleled in our region. The quality of the facility and the capacity for growth allow us to expand the number of students participating in music, but also the quality of music we create."

"The building creates a sense of positivity and confidence that is noticeable," Heide said. "This building allows the focus to shift to what is possible."

Music student and elementary education major Tanner Douville of Twin Valley, Minn., said he feels more confident in his musical abilities because of the Center for the Arts.

"With the new instruments and practice rooms it is easier to feel more confident in myself and the music department," the sophomore said. Douville said he spends most of his time in the practice rooms or social areas of the building and really enjoys spaces to collaborate.

"I feel like I have more of a connection with my fellow classmates," he said. "We all have more space to breathe."

The move into the new building began in earnest in January of this year.

Through fall semester last year, music students were primarily found at Foss
Hall and art students worked in various lab and art spaces in McCarthy Hall.

Work to build a new Center for the Arts was underway for years but finally became a reality on May 2, 2019.

Gov. Doug Burgum signed Senate Bill No. 2297, providing \$32 million for the new space. In less than two months, construction had started and the building process was underway.

"There was a lot of external support that came from a practical point of view." LaFave said.

Any flood impact, even a small one, could greatly damage expensive music equipment like grand pianos, electronics and instruments.


It was essential to replace the space Foss Hall provided.

"The process to make this a reality was very collaborative," LaFave said. "It took a lot of effort from a lot of people, and I could not be more proud of being a part of that process."

Now, with the building in use and spaces being filled with arts and music, LaFave said he is enthusiastic about the future.

"I'm most excited about what this means for our future," LaFave said. "The growth, collaboration and opportunities the CFA will provide are tremendous."

Valley City State University Successfully Reaccredited by the Higher Learning Commission

VCSU "Healthy, Forward-Looking Culture" Noted by the Review Team

Valley City State University (VCSU) has officially been reaccredited by the Higher Learning Commission (HLC).

The accreditation follows a comprehensive evaluation by the HLC that included a review of VCSU policies, procedures and documents. The process also included an in-person, on-campus visit with HLC officials late last year. The review found strong educational, governance and cultural components present at VCSU. The next HLC accreditation site visit will be during the 2031-32 school year.

"The HLC accreditation process provides a comprehensive review of the entire campus and assures quality by verifying that we meet standards and are engaged in continuous improvement," VCSU President Alan LaFave said. "This validates the trust HLC has in our faculty and staff to continue providing the best educational experiences possible. This is a proud moment for our entire institution."

Every core component listed by the HLC was met during the reaccreditation process.

"Our faculty and staff did a great job in preparing materials for this review. Their work highlights the many advances we have made at VCSU academically and on campus," Margaret Dahlberg, Vice President of Academic Affairs, said. "This accreditation shows that we continue to offer quality educational opportunities in line with our mission and purpose."

Two areas of note are the efforts made to better utilize assessment when making critical decisions and the shared governance structures present on campus.

"VCSU has met all of the Criteria for Accreditation and has a healthy, forward-looking culture that uses evidence of institutional and program effectiveness to inform decisions and to make improvements," the HLC report states.



Winter commencement was held Thursday, Dec. 16, in Vangstad Auditorium. With this commencement, VCSU will have conferred 27,038 undergraduate degrees and 529 master's degrees. Speakers included master's student Nick Lee, faculty member Rachelle Hunt, President Alan LaFave and State Board of Higher Education member Jeffry Volk.

127 students received degrees. This included the awarding of 99 bachelor's degrees and 28 master's degrees. 23 of the individuals receiving master's degrees were awarded a Master of Education. Five were awarded a Master of Arts in Teaching.



the Computer Systems and Software Engineering Department said.

"This master of science degree is a collaboration between business communication, software engineering

and computer information systems. We will also be using software like SAP and Salseforce so people will have the opportunity to become even more employable by the time they graduate."

7th Consecutive Spring Enrollment Record at VCSU

Total headcount of 1,660 students for spring semester

Valley City State University (VCSU) has set a spring enrollment record for the seventh consecutive year with 1,660 total students enrolled. This includes 1,509 undergraduate students and 151 graduate students.


In the past 10 years, enrollment has increased by more than 350 students. Last spring there were 1,632 students enrolled.

Ranked 2nd in North Dakota for Online Master's and Bachelor's Programs



Valley City State University's (VCSU) online master's in education and bachelor's degree

programs have been recognized by U.S. News and World Report in its Best Online Programs rankings.

VCSU was ranked second in North Dakota in both master's and bachelor's online programs. Factors considered in the rankings include student engagement, services and technologies available to students, faculty credentials and training, as well as expert opinion on the academic quality of programs. Student excellence is also considered for schools offering online master's degree programs.

"We continue to develop and offer a wide variety of degrees in dynamic ways that help students become future leaders," President Alan LaFave said. "We are a technology-driven school, and this nationwide ranking reaffirms the high-quality educational experiences our students receive in the classroom and online."

VCSU's new Master of Science degree in Business Information Systems launched in 2022, and is intended to meet workforce needs in the community and statewide. This degree track is currently offered exclusively online.

The VCSU Master of Education (M.Ed.) program offers six concentrations: elementary education, English education, library and information technologies, teaching English language learners, teaching and technology and technology education. The university also offers a Master of Arts in Teaching (M.A.T.) program, designed to help individuals with degrees in non-teaching fields earn teaching licenses.

Online bachelor's programs at VCSU include business education, business process integration management, career and technical education, communication, elementary education, English, English education, history, history education, management, math education, music, social science, social science education and technology education.

2006 Softball Team

The 2006 VCSU softball team won the Region III Tournament and advanced to the NAIA World Series for just the second time in program history.

The Vikings compiled a 36-19 overall record. The Vikings shined brightest in the postseason, taking second in the Dakota Athletic Conference Postseason Tournament before sweeping through the Region III Tournament with a 4-0 record and earning their spot at the NAIA World Series. Pitching and defense carried the Vikings as they outscored their Region III opponents 9-3 over those four games, including two 1-0 victories. VCSU then went 1-3 in pool play at the NAIA



World Series in Decatur, Ala. VCSU finished the season with a combined 1.68 team ERA and 17 shutouts. Karalea Morris threw two no-hitters and one perfect game, while Alana Purvis recorded two no-hitters. Morris was named All-American and Region III Tournament MVP. Morris, Kelli Unrein and Ruby Garza were named all-conference.

The 36 wins was one of more than a dozen team and individual school records set by the team. Individuals from the 2006 team still hold current school records for home runs (Kelli Unrein, 15), stolen bases (Jackie O'Neill, 49) and strikeouts (Karalea Morris, 340). Team members included RaeAnne Cote, Karalea Morris, Katie Cavallaro, Ruby Garza, Charla Bick, Alisha Sackman, Jackie O'Neill, Molly Schultz, Alana Purvis, Kelli Unrein, Kelli Baumgartner, Tara Coates, Sadie Smith, Amanda Bryson, Carling Beninger, Jennifer Thorson, Jessica Ruzicki and Lara Loomis. Chad Slyter was head coach, and Christy Capner was assistant coach. Student assistants were Jenni Crom and Josh Plecity.



Molly (Anderson) Welstad '03

Watford City, N.D. Women's Basketball, 2000-02

Anderson transferred to VCSU prior to her junior season in 2000-01 and went on to score 1,029

points in just two years with the VCSU women's basketball team. Anderson made an immediate impact on the program and earned 1st Team All-Conference in both 2001 and 2002. A sharp-shooting guard from Watford City, Anderson made 176 career 3-pointers (2nd all-time at VCSU) and dished out 272 career assists (4.5/game). She scored a school record 536 points during the 2001-02 season and averaged 17.4 points per game during her Viking career. Her 91 3-pointers during the 2001-02 season still stands as a school record.



Loni (Hall) Thilmony '07

Parshall, N.D. Women's Basketball, 2004-07

Loni Hall was a four-year impact player for the VCSU women's basketball team, leaving her mark as the school's all-time leading

rebounder and one of the best post players in history. Hall was named the Dacotah Athletic Conference Freshman of the Year in 2004 and went on to earn All-Conference honors each of the next three seasons. She was also named All-American once during her career and earned an Academic All-American award as a senior. Hall finished her Viking career with 1,626 points, ranking second all-time at VCSU. She currently holds school records for career rebounds (855) and free throws made (423).



Josh Kasowski '05

Valley City, N.D. Football, 2000-04

Josh Kasowski racked up 346 career tackles as a fierce linebacker on the

Valley City State football team from 2000 to 2004. A native of Valley City, Kasowski excelled on the hometown team and finished his career as the school's all-time leading tackler. Kasowski had 155 tackles and 13 tackles for loss as a senior, ranking second in the nation with 15.5 tackles per game. He also topped 100 tackles as a junior, recording a team-high 123 stops. He was a two-time All-Conference selection and was named 1st Team All-American in 2004. Kasowski's 346 tackles currently rank him third in VCSU history. He also finished his career with 26 tackles for loss, 11.5 sacks and six forced fumbles. He played immediately as a freshman, recording 17 tackles on VCSU's conference championship team in 2000.



Matt Johnson '01

Sawyer, N.D. Baseball, 1997-2000

Johnson was a three-time All-Conference selection and was named the North

Dakota Collegiate Athletic Conference Most Valuable Senior, excelling as a standout catcher and hitter during his Viking baseball career. A native of Sawyer, N.D., Johnson tallied a .354 career batting average and a .428 on-base percentage during his four years at VCSU. He hit 14 home runs and collected 90 RBIs. He earned All-Conference in 1997, 1998 and 2000, and he was named NDCAC Most Valuable Senior, Honorable Mention All-

American and NAIA Scholar-Athlete after his senior season in 2000. Johnson batted .362 as a senior with 34 RBI, eight home runs and a .622 slugging percentage.



Karalea (Morris) Hoyano '07

White Rock, British Columbia Softball, 2005-06

Hoyano was a two-time all-conference selection as a pitcher and was named

honorable mention All-American after her senior season in 2006. A native of White Rock, B.C., Hoyano transferred to VCSU before her junior season in 2005. During her Viking career, Hoyano pitched 361.2 innings and compiled a 1.99 career ERA. She finished her two years at VCSU with 490 strikeouts, 48 complete games, 14 shutouts, two no-hitters and one perfect game. She posted a 22-10 record with a 1.56 ERA and a schoolrecord 340 strikeouts during her senior season, leading the Vikings to the Region III Championship and an appearance at the NAIA World Series. Hoyano was named MVP of the Region III Tournament after pitching all of the Vikings' 28 innings in a dominating performance. She started the tournament with a no-hitter and allowed just one earned run over four games.



Basketball Season Recap



Highly Successful Season for Men's Basketball

The Valley City State men's basketball team won 18 games and advanced to the North Star Athletic Association Final Four during a highly successful 2021-22 season.

The Vikings finished the year with an 18-11 overall record and went 8-6 in conference play as they earned the No. 3 seed for the NSAA Postseason Tournament. The Vikings defeated in-state rival Dickinson State in the first round of the playoffs, advancing to the NSAA Final Four in Watertown, S.D. VCSU's season came to an end in the semifinals of the conference tournament, dropping a 72-66 game to eventual champion Bellevue University.

Two VCSU seniors – Connor Entzi and Kevin Schramm – scored their 1,000th career point during the season, becoming part of a group of just 20 Vikings who have accomplished that feat in program history.

Schramm was named 1st Team All-Conference for the second consecutive season, averaging 12 points and five rebounds per game. He was also named NSAA Player of the Week twice. Senior Chris Thompson was named Honorable Mention All-Conference after averaging 8 points, 3 rebounds, 2.5 assists and 1.5 steals per game. Entzi was named VCSU's Champion of Character – someone who best represents the NAIA's five core values of integrity, respect, responsibility, sportsmanship and servant leadership.

Schramm, Thompson, Entzi and senior guard Jalen Addison – who scored 12 points per game this year – wrapped up their Viking careers, which included 37 team wins over the past two seasons.

The Vikings sported a deep roster during the 2021-22 season with 10 players averaging more than 5 points per game. Junior Hunter Sand also earned an NSAA Player of the Week award after scoring 31 points in a victory against Presentation College.



Women's Basketball Finishes 3rd in NSAA Standings

The Valley City State women's basketball team concluded the 2022 season with a 10-15 overall record and went 7-7 in conference play to earn a No. 3 seed for the NSAA Tournament. The No. 3 Vikings hosted No. 6 Bellevue in the opening round of the tournament at the Bubble. The Bruins defeated the Vikings 62-51 to advance to the NSAA Final Four.

Following the regular season, four VCSU women's basketball players earned conference recognition. Ashlyn Diemert, a freshman guard from West Fargo, N.D., was named NSAA Freshman of the Year. Diemert averaged 10.4 points per game and totaled 38 assists and 24 steals on the season. She scored a career-best 21 points on Feb. 5 at Viterbo.

Adriana Torres, a junior guard from Pelican Rapids, Minn., was named Second Team All-Conference. Torres averaged 12.9 points/game and totaled 35 assists on the season. She scored her career-high 25 points in a win over Waldorf on Feb. 4.

Taryn Dieterle, a junior forward from Valley City, was named Honorable Mention All-Conference. She averaged 10.1 points and 7.3 rebounds/game. Dieterle grabbed a career-high 16 rebounds twice this season and hit a pair of game-winning shots in the final seconds during games against Dickinson State and Bellevue.

Allie Critchley, a junior guard from Dilworth, Minn., was named a Champion of Character, which is presented to the student-athlete who best exemplifies the five core values of the NAIA Champions of Character program: respect, integrity, servant leadership, sportsmanship and responsibility.

2022 Indoor Track & Field Recap

BROOKINGS, S.D. – Valley City State University (VCSU) athletes won three conference championships, set or tied five school records, and had 13 All-Conference performances during the NSAA Indoor Track & Field Championships contested Feb. 20 in Brookings, S.D.

Zachary Co (shot put), JT Reed (60 meters) and Brooke Malsom (long jump) all won individual conference titles for the Vikings, and both Valley City State teams finished in fourth place out of seven team at the North Star Athletic Association conference championships.

VCSU head coach Laquone Robinson was proud of VCSU's accomplishments on the day, with numerous athletes competing at their highest level yet this season.

"Hands down, this was the best meet I've been a part of since joining Valley City State," said Robinson. "Going into this meet, we were clear that each athlete had a job to do; to focus on themselves and perform their personal best. When each individual focused on themselves in their moment, it allowed our team to rise as a whole. They competed at their highest level today, and it was so much fun to be a part of."

Sprinter and jumper Brooke Malsom had a day to remember as she was named both the NSAA's Most Valuable Athlete and the Field Athlete of the Year. Malsom won a conference title in the long jump, placed second in the triple jump and set new school records in both

the 60 and 200 meter races. In her four events, Malsom finished with four Top 4 finishes – including three All-Conference performances. She became the first women in VCSU history to go below 8 seconds in the 60 meter dash, and she shattered the school record in the 200 meters with a time of 25.83 seconds – nearly a second faster than the old record of 26.70 seconds set by Kerri Turnbough in 2002.

On the mens' side, JT Reed won a conference title in the 60 meter dash and tied his school record with a time of 6.96 seconds. Zachary Co won his third straight conference title in the shot put and added another All-Conference performance with a third place in the weight throw. Co has now won five individual conference titles and has won the last three NSAA



indoor shot put titles. He competed in both shotput and weight throw at the NAIA Indoor National Championships and placed 8th in shot put to earn All-American honors.

Other All-Conference (Top 3) performances came from Taylor Sargent (60 hurdles and pentathlon), Hannah Gordon (shot put and weight throw), Sadie Hansen (shot put), Clay Kummer (60 hurdles) and Noah Rolfe (mile run).

During the 2022 indoor season, the Vikings set school records in nine different events.

VCSU will start the outdoor season in late March. Valley City State University will host the 2022 NSAA Outdoor Conference Championships on May 12-13 at VCSU's John & Diane Hill Track & Field Complex.



Spring Sports Quick Hits

The spring sports season is already underway at Valley City State, which both the baseball and softball teams are more than a dozen games into their respective seasons. And for the first time since 2014, the Valley City State track & field teams will host a home meet. The Vikings are set to host a meet in April and then will host the NSAA Conference Championships in May.

Softball Starts 7-5

The Viking softball team opened the 2022 season in February with games at the Minot Dome and Presentation College Dome. VCSU has started the season with a 7-5 record and won its last four games. The Viking softball team picked up two notable wins over rival University of Jamestown.

The Vikings were picked to finish second in the 2022 NSAA Softball Coaches' Preseason poll and received one first place vote in the poll. VCSU returns most of its starters from the



2021 season including six All-Conference selections and two Gold Glove recipients.

VCSU's Joelle Lamontagne and Jessica Husband were named NSAA Players of the Week on Feb. 21, after a 4-0 weekend at the PC Dome.

VCSU travels to Tucson, Ariz. for 11 games March 9-16 before kicking off the conference season on March 26. VCSU hosts its conference opener against 2021 NSAA Tournament Champion Dickinson

State. The Vikings will play a 51-game schedule in 2022, including 28 conference contests. The NSAA conference tournament will be played in Watertown, S.D., on May 5-8.

Track and Field Hosting NSAA Championships

Coming off a successful indoor season, the VCSU track and field teams will have a busy spring with nine outdoor meets currently on the schedule.

The outdoor season culminates with the NSAA Outdoor Conference Championships, which will be hosted by Valley City State University at the recently reconstructed John & Diane Hill Track & Field Complex in Valley City.

VCSU is also scheduled to host a meet in April – the first home meet for VCSU since the 2014 season.



Golf Season Begins March 28

The Valley City State golf teams will take to the course March 28 for their first meet of the spring season. The Vikings are scheduled to play four meets this spring, culminating with the NSAA Championships, April 25-26 in Albert Lea, Minn.

Baseball goes 6-2 in Fall Games

The Viking Baseball team has been ramping up for a busy month of March. The Vikings are scheduled to play 18 games on the road during the month of March, including four games at U.S. Bank Stadium in Minneapolis, and seven games in Tucson, Ariz.

Valley City State enters the spring schedule with a 6-2 overall record after playing eight games during the fall season. It was VCSU's most successful fall since the team started playing fall baseball back in 2013.

Valley City State was picked to finish third in the NSAA Baseball Preseason Coaches' Poll behind Bellevue University and Mayville State. The Vikings return the bulk of their lineup from last year's team that went 23-26 overall and finished third in the NSAA with a 14-9 conference record. That lineup hit a school-record 80 home runs, including a single-season record of 18 by graduating senior Jorun Hamre.

Infielder David Demeter is back after hitting 14 home runs and 48 RBIs last season, while outfielder/catcher Dustin Mertz is coming off a freshman season that saw him hit .405 with 10 home runs and 22 extra-base hits. Speedster JT Reed swiped 22 bases last season while batting .303 with seven home runs and 35 RBIs. They'll help anchor what should once again be a strong batting order.

"The offensive lineup should be very good again," said head coach Casey Olney. "Losing Jorun is a significant loss, but



pretty much everybody else that was a big factor in our lineup is back. So it's a very experienced lineup and we're adding a few new pieces to it as well that should make it a little more dynamic."

On the mound, veteran arms Reed Butz, William Hlady and Chase Feller will be expected to anchor VCSU's pitching rotation. The trio totaled five wins and pitched 44 of VCSU's 61 innings during the fall season.

The NSAA Baseball Tournament will be played May 6-9 in Forest City, Iowa.



has opened Willow Creek Chiropractic in Claresholm, Alberta. George's family lives a few blocks away.


"The people I met in Valley were so kind to me and nice to me that I will remember and appreciate them forever," George said, adding, "I hope I can now provide that same experience for my patients."

Preceding Wendell in death were his parents, Clara and Roy Gillund; brother, Dr. RC Gillund; and infant daughter, Kathleen.






